Dear Parents / Guardians,

I hope you enjoy our first newsletter of the 2019/2020 school year. A warm welcome to all the Junior Infant families and new families who joined our St. Patrick's community in August and "welcome back" to our regular readers!

The AGM of the Parent Association was held in early October. Highlights included an outline of the successful fundraising of the committee last year and an insightful presentation from Mr O'Doherty on standardised testing results and the current financial situation.

In late October I was honoured to be nominated as Chair of the Parent's Association for the next two years, with Maeve McNamara as Vice Chair. The Treasurer, Catherine Kelly, and Secretary, Amanda Breen, remain in office for another year. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Fiona Murphy and Keith Parker for their fantastic work, time and effort over the last two years as Chair and Vice Chair. They took us to Hell and Back not just once, but twice!! I am delighted to say that they are both remaining on the committee.

You will have received the reference guide to headlice before mid-term break. Hopefully, by working together we can minimise the spread and reduce the stress. Well done to Fiona Murphy and Maeve McNamara for their research and publication of this very useful guide.

Christmas Colours Day: will take place on Thursday 19 December. Santa and his elves visit the children in their classes with a small treat and afterwards the children get to watch a Christmas film. The children are invited to wear Christmas colours on this day. A big thank you to the Student Council who help us run this fun day in the school.

Every year we put together hampers to be raffled, one for each class group from 1st to 6th and two for both the Junior and Senior Infant classes given their numbers. The draw for the hampers takes place on Christmas Colours Day.

We ask for a €2 donation per family or a €1 donation per child on this day. The money will be used to buy supplies for a Dignity Pack production line. We have had two excellent production line packing days in April 2018 and February 2019 and we look forward to another great day in the new year.

Cake sale: the annual cake sale will be held on a date to be decided in early 2020 before the Easter break.

Book drive: in January we will invite you to donate books to the school that your children have read and that are still in excellent condition. We will then identify books from those donated that can be used to reinvigorate the stock of books both in the school and classroom libraries. A letter will be sent home in the new year which will give you a better idea of the types of books we are looking for, so, in the meantime, please don't send those old books to the recycling centre!

Tree Day in Glendalough


