




Ms Condren's Senior Infants

Dear Parents,

Writing this piece for the Christmas newsletter affords me the opportunity to reflect on the events of the first term and to take stock of just how much change has taken place within a short space of time.

The Parents' Committee continues to grow which is testimony to people's willingness to get involved. The new committee is chaired by Emma Forde and I would like to wish Emma, her officers and all the members of the committee well for the coming year and I look forward to working closely with them on behalf of the school community. I must also acknowledge the huge debt of thanks owed to the outgoing Chairperson, Carol Whelan and her Vice Chairperson Suresh Mariyappa. They worked tirelessly on behalf of the Association during their two year term of office and we are indebted to them for their contribution. The new committee is endeavouring to keep parents up to date with the activities of the Parent Association by means of their new Facebook page. As I understand it, this a closed group available only to parents of children in St. Patrick's and I hope parents will find it useful.

As you will note from these pages, we have also had the election of our new Student Council. The new council is chaired by Kaylagh Corish from 6th Class and we wish Kaylagh and her fellow council members every success in their work during the year. We also assure them of our support as they endeavour to represent the views and ideas of their fellow students.

Recently, one of our longest serving members of staff, Mrs. Susan Bleakley, retired and I would like to pay tribute to her wonderful service to the school community and the children of St. Patrick's during her career. In recent years, Mrs. Bleakley worked in the area of Special Education and made a significant contribution to the development of that area.

This support has been visibly demonstrated by the increased level of Voluntary Contributions received to date and the wonderful response to the cake sale in aid of Concern's Philippines Disaster Appeal. We do not take that support for granted and may we reassure you of our absolute commitment to your children. We look forward to continuing to work with you in their best interests in the New Year

I hope to see many of you in the coming weeks, whether it be at Nativity plays Carol Evenings, etc. As I say each year, it is a very special time in the lives of children and it is a privilege for us to share in their joy and excitement.

Activity Maths in 3rd Class

Every Friday, Ms O'Leary visits our class for an hour and we play Maths games and activities. We play lots of different things. Sometimes, we do stations. This means that we move from group to group doing different activities. Sometimes, we do a fun worksheet, games on the whiteboard, a number game with Ms O'Leary or a partners Maths quiz with Ms Flack.

Over the last few weeks, we played a few different games. One was called 'Kings.' It is a multiplication game. To play it you have to have four players and turn over the different colours to count in different numbers. Another game we play is 'One More.' In this game, everyone has a card. There is a question and a number. A person reads the question and the girl with the right answer stands up and reads the next question. We also played a game called, 'Ones, tens and hundreds.' The teacher would start on a number. If you were a ten, you would count up ten more and if you were a hundred, you would count up one hundred more. Sometimes Ms O'Leary would ask us to count backwards. We really enjoy Maths activities - it is really fun!

Science Week in 4th Class! November 10th – 17th, 2013

For Science Week we had lots of fun! Our teachers organised lots of experiments for our classes. On Monday Ms.Ryan/Mrs.Martin's class had an "Experiment Day". On Tuesday, the 12th of November, it was our turn and on Wednesday it was the turn of Ms. DeHora's class. There were four different stations set up in the class.

Station 1

We looked at static electricity.

We used a biro and ripped paper. First we charged the biro by rubbing it against our jumpers. Then the pieces of paper stuck to the biro!

Second of all we needed a balloon each. We rubbed the balloons against our heads and then against our jumpers to see what would happen.

When we raised the balloons over our heads after charging them our hair stood up!





Station 2

We used sellotape to look at our fingerprints.

We used a pencil and drew very heavily on a small piece of paper.

We had to push one of our fingers into the pencil mark. When we lifted it, we stuck a piece of sellotape on to our finger.

When we pulled it off we could see our fingerprint on the tape. We used magnifying hand lenses to check our prints for ridges, lines and cusps.



Station 3

At this station we looked at dissolving materials. We had lots of different materials: salt, washing powder, sand, coffee, flour and sugar. We had to stir a small quantity of each into water to see which dissolved and which did not.

Station 4

Firstly we had to work as a group to see what materials would be attracted to magnets. We had a drinks can, metal spoon, pencil, drawing pin, paper clip, aluminium foil and a nail. We all took turns in the group to test each one to see if it would "stick" to the magnet.

Secondly we made our own magnets! We all got a nail and we had to stroke it 30 times in the same direction with a magnet. We then had to see if it had become a magnet by testing it with paper clips, pins etc.
